Artist of the Year Mina Papatheodorou-Valyraki: A Legacy of Artistic Triumph from a Greek Daphne to An American One

The Greek mythological Daphne was a mountain nymph loved by Apollo. The mortal Leucippus also loved her and disguised himself as a nymph to win her affection. When the nymphs discovered his deceit, they killed him. Apollo continued to pursue Daphne, but her father, the river god Peneus, turned her into a laurel tree. Apollo promised "Since you cannot be my wife, you shall assuredly be my tree. I will wear you for my crown. I will decorate you with my harp and quiver; and when the great Roman conquerors lead up the triumphal pomp to the Capitol, you shall be woven into wreaths for their brows. And, as eternal youth is mine, you also shall be always green, and your leaf

know no decay." The nymph, now changed into a laurel tree, bowed her head in grateful acknowledgment. Henceforth all politicians, writers, poets, athletes and artists would receive leaves from the tree in the form of championship wreaths.

The leaves of Daphne's tree, woven into the crowns of champions, have come to signify excellence in athletics and cultural achievement.
